Commercial Air Service

- American Airlines
 - Full merger with US Airways completed
- 4 flights/day to & from Charlotte
 - Reduction from 5 flights/day in 2014
- 3 jets and 1 turboprop



Recruitment of 2nd Airline

- Small Community Air Service Development Program (SCASDP) grant application
 - USDOT annual, competitive grant process
 - Assists small communities in improving air service
 - 2016 grant opportunity announced March 28th & applications are due May 2nd
 - Application will request grant amount of \$750K
 - Local match
 - 16 local organizations/businesses have pledged \$240K in matching funds
 - PGV has pledged \$450K
 - Grant awards should be announced July/August 2016
 - Getting the grant is crucial in efforts to recruit another airline
 - Receipt of grant does not ensure we can obtain new air service

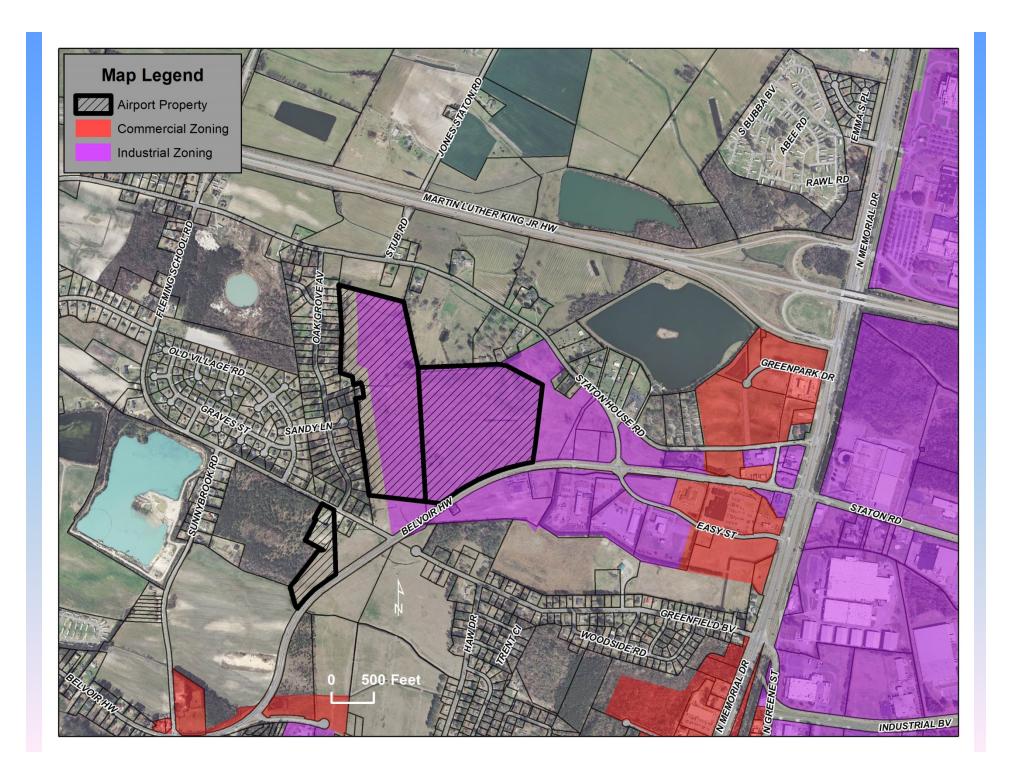
Land Development Project

What are Pitt County Needs North of the River?

- PGV Assumptions
 - Jobs
 - New business investment & development
 - New services & amenities for residents
 - Increased tax base

Potential Land Development

- PGV is exploring feasibility of developing some airport properties for nonaeronautical purposes
- In process of conducting land development feasibility study
 - Potential uses for property
 - Potential grant funding sources
 - Strategy for pursuing grants



Why Pursue Non-Aeronautical Development of Airport Property?

- PGV aeronautical-related revenues are flat
- Minimal opportunities for new revenue streams
- Commercial business, office or industrial development would generate new, reliable revenue streams
- Reduces pressure to increase fees charged to aeronautical users of airport
- Diversifies revenues to compensate for volatile swings in aviation industry
- Would stimulate growth North of the River

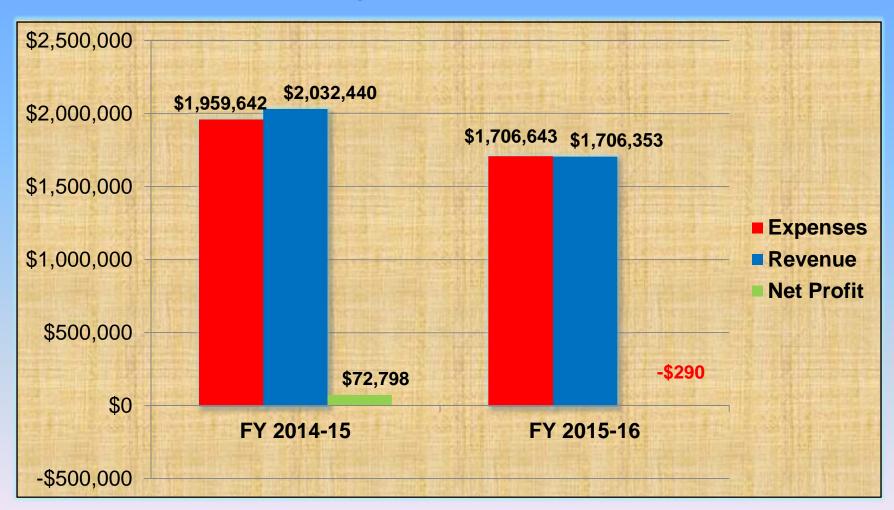
Revenues Vs Expenses

PGV Financial Trends

- Corporate hangar development project has potential to reverse declining revenue trend through increased rent and fuel sales
- However, PGV believes it is important to pursue other revenue streams for longterm financial health

EDA Grant Successes for Airports

- Provo, UT
 - \$3.5M to improve infrastructure for new maintenance facility
- Rockford, IL
 - \$2.5M for airport industrial park
- San Bernardino, CA
 - \$3.1M for airport roadway improvements
- Brunswick/Glynn County, GA
 - \$750K to upgrade airport infrastructure

Next Steps

- PGV is moving forward on this project
 - Further refine project scope
 - Determine local partnership opportunities
 - Finalize grant application strategy
 - Proceed with grant applications
- PGV has received a letter of support for the project from the Board of Commissioners to the Mid-East Commission
 - Prerequisite to apply for US Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration grants

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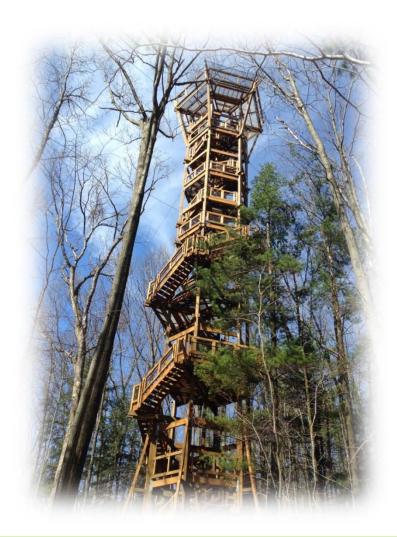

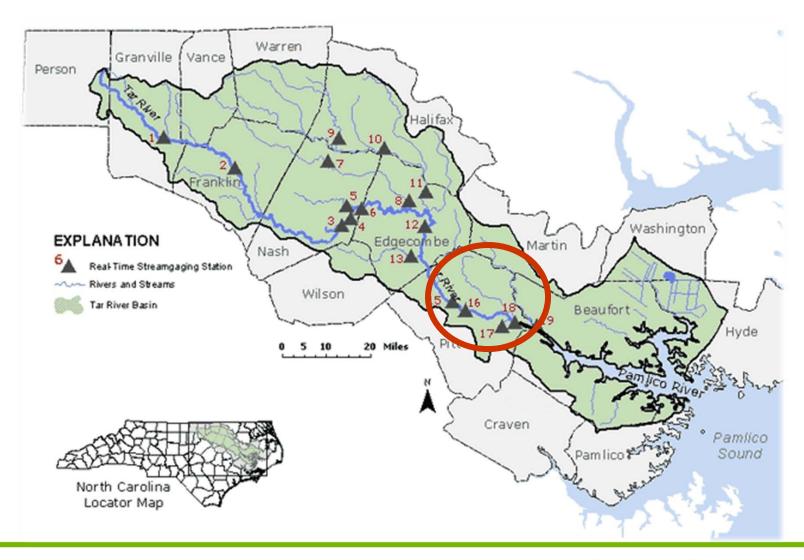






Approximate Sites of Camping Platforms





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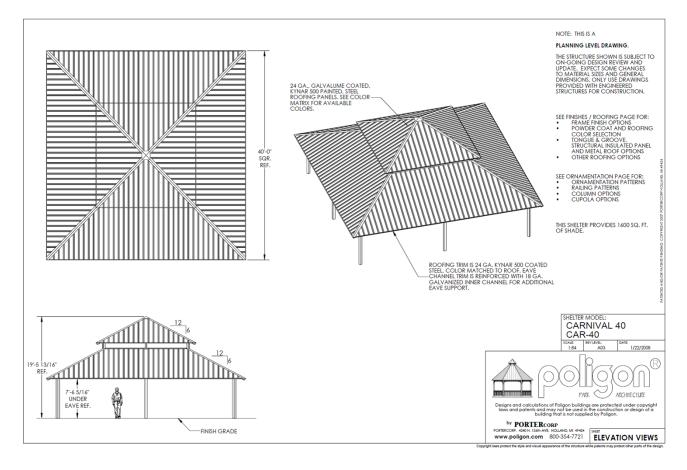
Fishing Pier Concept

Tyler Technologies Munis Software Implementation Update



- Approved budget of \$2.5 million to replace financial related software – Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) – January 13, 2014
- Project began 06-03-2014
- Phase I Replace Financial Accounting and Budgeting Software – Implemented 07-01-15
- Phase II Replace Human Resources Management and Payroll Software - Implemented 04-01-16



- Phase III Extended Financials (Cash Management, CAFR, Business/Vendor Self-Service, Employee Expense Reimbursement, Performance Based Budgeting, Work Flow Revenue, Tyler Cashiering, Citizen Self-Service) – Implemented 04-01-16
- Phase IV Parking Tickets (Hectronics, UPSafety) –
 Implemented 08-03-2015; Central Property File (EnerGov)
 Implementation Scheduled for 10-10-2016



 Phase V – Work Orders, Facilities – Implementation Scheduled for 10-01-16

EnerGov – Will replace Permitting and Inspections

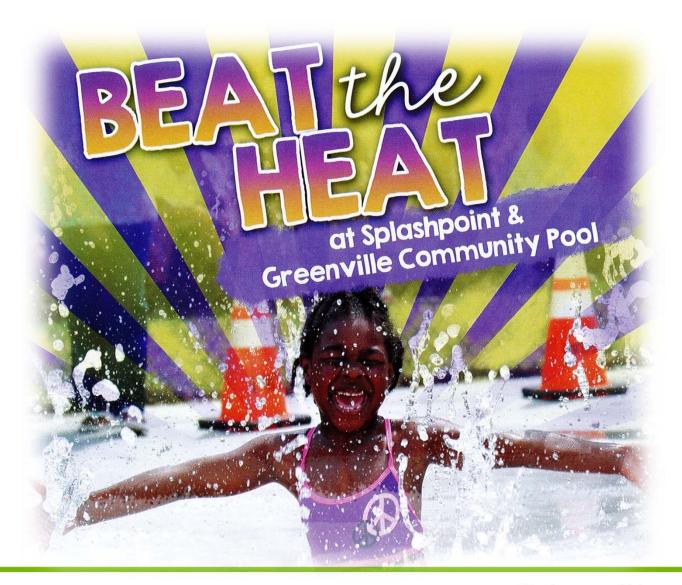
