- Foster equality of opportunity within our community.

- Other areas critical to establishing inclusivity.



NTC - Town Common Playground Foundation Repair

Warranty repairs on the surfacing of the Inclusive Playground at Town Common will begin on Monday, March 12, which will require the temporary closure of the playground. The surface of the playground will be removed in order for repair to the foundation. Depending on weather and any other unforeseen challenges, we anticipate the work will be completed within a month.

Late last year we began noticing some growing indentations in the accessible surfacing of the playground. An examination by Parks Planner Lamarco Morrison and the original contractor determined that this developing defect would likely worsen if not addressed, but was covered under warranty.

Unfortunately, correcting the problem will require a temporary closure of the playground, and the work may only be done when temperatures are above 45°. Signage will be posted alerting users of the pending repairs, and our friends at Trillium Health Resources will also be notified.

Obviously playground visitors will be disappointed, and I regret that. But if we do not act now, the problem will likely worsen, and the warranty will no longer be in effect.

NTC - World Water Day and STEAM Lab Grand Opening, March 22<sup>nd</sup> at River Park North

On Thursday, March 22, 2018, River Park North and *Love a Sea Turtle* (LAST) will host the official kickoff of the "EarthEcho Water Challenge," as part of the United Nations' *World Water Day*. A highlight of the day here in Greenville will be the grand opening of the *Love a Sea Turtle STEAM Lab* within the park's Stasavich Science and Nature Center, currently home to the only permanent EarthEcho water testing site in the nation.

The Water Challenge is a program of EarthEcho International, a nonprofit organization founded on the belief that if equipped with the skills and knowledge to protect the world's water resources, young people have the power to change our planet. Established by Philippe and Alexandra Cousteau in honor of their father Philippe Cousteau Sr. and grandfather Jacques-Yves Cousteau, the organization's mission is to inspire young people worldwide to act now for a sustainable future.

Love A Sea Turtle is a partner with Greenville Recreation and Parks and provides hands-on outdoor nature-based programs and support. LAST was instrumental in seeking and securing an NC Science Museum grant that enabled the creation of the Center's STEAM Lab.

The purpose of the Water Challenge is to build public awareness and involvement in protecting the world's water resources by engaging citizens in the basic monitoring of their local waterbodies.

A Steam Lab ribbon cutting will be held at noon that day in the Center. Members of City Council and city staff are invited to participate and see the lab in action during the day's events, which will take place from 9:30 a.m. to 2 pm.
