SUBJECT:	GFR Trains with NCEM on Flood Response

On April 18, 2018 Greenville Fire/Recue, North Carolina Emergency Management (NCEM), the North Carolina Helo-Aquatic Rescue Team (NCHART), and other local agencies will partner to complete practical exercises similar to those events encountered locally during hurricane's Floyd and Matthew. In October 2016, Hurricane Matthew caused significant flooding in the Greenville area. The night of the storm, Greenville Fire/Rescue executed more than 100 rescues. Trainings like this one allow the department to stay ready when and if the area sees another major storm.

The NCHART team works with emergency services personnel from around the state and the North Carolina National Guard to provide support during natural and manmade disasters. Members from Greenville Fire/Rescue will assist in the training, serving as both victims while other agencies train and as a rescue team relaying information to air support personnel, much like during a real emergency.

The training will take place at a City-owned property near the intersection of Mumford Road and Pactolus Highway and runs from 2:00 p.m. -10:00 p.m. Expect increased air traffic during this time.
