Subject: City Hall Roofing Project

The City Hall roofing project will begin the week of July 20, 2015, with an anticipated completion date of late October 2015. Due to necessary lay-down and mobilization areas during the roof rehabilitation, several parking spots behind City Hall will not be available. Three parking spots will be available during this project; they are currently labeled Mayor, Mayor-Pro Tem and Reserved. Additionally, the ADA parking spaces facing City Hall will remain open.

Arrangements have been made with GUC to utilize several parking spaces in their lot throughout the duration of this project. The attached map identifies the area that is available for City Council Members to park within. No spaces have been reserved, and parking in the area will remain available to their customers throughout the construction period. Vacant spaces in this area are available most of the time.

The general public should be directed to the Five Points Plaza parking lot for their parking needs for City Hall business.

SUBJECT: Certificate of Appropriateness applications submitted by ECU

On May 20, 2015, East Carolina University submitted five (5) Certificate of Appropriateness applications for the demolition of 601 East Fifth Street, 405 South Summit Street, 407 South Summit Street, 409-11 South Summit Street, and 404 South Jarvis Street. These structures are included in the locally and nationally designated College View Historic District and are adjacent to the Dail House (Chancellor's Residence) at 605 East Fifth Street. ECU requested the removal of these properties to initiate the university's plans for the future expansion of the Chancellor's Residence. The applications indicated that the university would utilize the 365-day delay of demolition, allowed through Chapter 7, Section 9-7-17 (A) of the zoning ordinance, to search for prospective buyers interested in relocating the properties as a demolition alternative. Notifications were posted and mailed to adjacent property owners for a hearing that was to be held at the June 23rd meeting of the Historic Preservation Commission.

On June 22, 2015 staff was notified by the Environmental Review department of the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) that the state required ECU to withdraw the applications in order to maintain compliance with NCGS 121-12 (which establishes a procedure for the review of state undertakings that affect historic properties) and to continue with the state review process. ECU agreed to withdraw the applications and will be allowed to resubmit in May 2016.

In the interim, staff will be working with SHPO, ECU, and Preservation North Carolina to identify alternatives to demolition and/or prospective buyers of the properties. Staff will continue to provide updates as new information is received.



Recreation & Parks Monthly Report

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JULY 2015

DIRECTOR

- 1. The search for a new Park Superintendent has progressed slowly, but interviews are being scheduled for mid-July. Interview panel will include Mr. Kelvin Yarrell, Rocky Mount Parks and Recreation Director, Human Resources Department Staff Member Frank Salvato, Dr. Kindal Shores, Associate Professor of Recreation and Leisure Studies at ECU, and the GRPD Director. There were 67 applicants.
- 2. It's been a hot and challenging start to the GRPD's many summer day camps, but the staff has met the challenge, endured the heat, and provided some safe yet high quality recreational experiences to our young campers and their families. Most of the GRPD camps are filled to capacity, but a few spaces remain for some sessions.
- 3. Summer also impacts our administrative staff, as our payroll has swelled to 324 employees who serve in a multitude of programming and maintenance capacities. That size payroll adds tremendous

pressures and responsibility for staff.

4. The Exceptional Community Baseball League (ECBL) concluded its spring season on Saturday, 6/13, preceding their final games with a Family Fun Night at the Sarah Vaughn Field of Dreams the night before. This year's program included 14 teams and 170 participants. Once again ECBL received a Cal Ripken Senior Foundation support grant of \$2,500.

PARKS DIVISION

INTERIM PARKS SUPERINTENDENT

 Due to excessive and expensive vandalism (\$1500+), the restrooms at the Dream Park have been locked during nonsprayground operation hours. A porta-jon for park patrons has been provided to use when the restrooms are locked. Thus far, our department has not received any complaints regarding this situation.

PARKS MAINTENANCE

- 1. Landscape crews ball field maintenance, mowing schedules, debris removal from Sarah Vaughn Field of Dreams, prepared grounds at Town Common, Sheppard Memorial Library, and Jaycee Park, and irrigation active with turf and plant beds.
- 2. Custodial crews cleaning service and litter collection. Cleaned trashed restrooms at Marvin's Mini Mart and Andrew A. Best Freedom Park.
- 3. Technician crews repaired sports lighting at West Meadowbrook Park; smaller projects included installation of concrete pad under Facility Management storage shelter, installation of drum component at the Dream Park playground, repairs completed to picnic tables and park benches on Greenway, repaired vandalism at numerous sites including Dream Park restrooms and shelter, Thomas Foreman Park shelter, Matthew Lewis shelter, Andrew A. Best Freedom Park shelter, and Kristin Drive playground.
- 4. Weekend Support crew set up and support for Sunday in The Park and litter collection and shelter service.
- 5. Set up and support *A Celebration of Youth Expression* at Town Common, *RiverFest* at River Park North, ECBL closing ceremonies at Elm Street Park, opening ceremonies for *Jackie Robinson Baseball League* at Thomas Foreman Park, and summer camps and programs.

- 2. \$5,000 donation was received from *Love A Sea Turtle* for a raised/screened camping platform. This donation, along with funding from Sound Rivers and the City, will make possible 3 such camping platforms along the Tar River in Greenville. They will be constructed by *Sound Rivers* this fall.
- 3. \$13,000 in donations have been secured for the construction of a Mobile Play Unit (Born Learning Trailer). Funds came from a Vidant Community Health Grant \$5,000, United Way \$4,000, and Grady White Smith Family Foundation \$4,000. The Unit will be ready for use late summer-early Fall 2015.
- 4. District Cub Scout Twilight Camp was held at RPN for the third year, 6/22-26.
- 5. RPN was the host site for a community discussion regarding early childhood literacy, attended by community leaders and educators.
- 6. RPN hosted a 3-day training by UNC Institute for the Environment for 26 teachers from Charlotte to the Coast (plus one RPN staff member).
- 7. Love A Sea Turtle has started hosting day camps at western acreage ("Lewis Property") of RPN.

Coming in July

PARKS PLANNING

- Town Common Have contracted with Moses Asphalt Repair to install concrete pads and site furniture.
 Installation will be complete by the end of July. Sawyer Residential & Marine Construction Inc. is currently in the design and permitting phase for the elevated pier and kayak landing project. Construction will begin in late summer. Staff is currently generating an RFQ for the design development phase of the Town Common improvements. The design development documents will reflect the proposed first phase of the project which includes the streetscape along First Street, parking improvements, pedestrian circulation, and ADA compliant sidewalks, a sprayground, playground area, amphitheater improvements, and a restroom/vendor facility.
- 2. South Greenville Recreation Center Architectural Design Hite Associates, P.C. has completed the 95% submittal of the construction documents, and Bree Associates has completed the cost analysis for the project. The project is over budget by 9% based on the latest cost estimate prepared by Bree Associates. Hite Associates is currently working with City staff on a value management plan to reduce costs.
- 3. "Tar River Park" Master Plan Staff has developed a second concept based on comments and recommendations made at the second input session, and a third concept based on feedback from stakeholders. All three concepts were presented during the public input session at the Recreation and Parks Commission meeting on 7/8.
- 4. Boyd Lee Park Entrance Renovations On-call contracts with Ark Consulting Engineers for the civil design have been approved. Ark is currently preparing design studies and cost estimates for the plaza area and drainage. They are also preparing bid documents for the improvements to the entrance to the park.


