

Re: Recreation and Parks Summer Programming

On Monday, February 3rd, registration opens for GRPD's summer camp programs, with most camps beginning Monday, June 8th. These camps include over 100 one-week or two-week sessions of art, nature, sports and day camps.

Our most popular summer programs are the all-day camps offered at six recreation facilities and designed for children five to 15. These camps provide early drop off and late pick-up options for parents, and are being offered at H. Boyd Lee Park, South Greenville Recreation Center, Drew Steele Center, Eppes Recreation Center, Greenfield Terrace and the Aquatics & Fitness Center.

Staff have also organized a camp for older youngsters 12-15. *Teen Voyager* is an all-day camp at Boyd Lee Park that will include activities planned around leadership and provide opportunities for volunteering. The program is a component of our initiative to get teenagers involved in activities and in our community.

Center for Arts and Crafts staff are also offering various summer camps. *Famous Artist Camp* will allow participants the opportunity to learn various art media during a one week camp and create pieces of art they'll keep. Staff are also looking forward to four sessions of dance camp, the summer version of the department's popular dance and ballet classes.

Youth Athletic staff are planning various sport-specific camps (baseball, basketball, soccer) which will also begin June 8th. Ages for these camps vary and staff expect an overall total of 175 participants. These camps allow participants to improve their sports skills in a non-competitive environment.

Nature camps are being offered by River Park North staff include *Nature's Explorers Camp* and *Preschool Nature Explorers Camp*, where campers participate in a variety of outdoor and nature-related activities such as fishing, kayaking, and hiking.

Staff are also busy preparing the Greenville Community Pool and Splashpoint at Dream Park for the summer. Both sites will begin regular season hours June 6th and operate seven days a week, being used by GRPD summer day camps weekday mornings and being open afternoons for public use.

Continuing preparations include finalizing schedules, purchasing supplies and training nearly 70 part-time employees, with a four-session training curriculum beginning Tuesday, May 19th. Summer camp employees must attend approximately 18 hours of training, which also includes obtaining their CPR/First Aid Certification through the American Red Cross.

Re: Highlights; Jaycee Park Center for Arts & Crafts

The Center for Arts & Crafts will begin the first quarter of 2020 by offering 41 individual programs available to over 250 youth and adults.

This represents the most arts programs ever held at the center during this time of year, despite the facility having just four programming rooms. The first session of programs are beginning this week, each program runs for four to 12 weeks (depending on class type). Classes include ballet & tap dance, drawing & painting, pottery, sewing, quilting, and homeschool arts & crafts.

Programs are but one center attraction. The pottery studio is also very active, providing space for local artists to drop in and create their own works of art during *open studio* hours, when pottery classes are not taking place. We currently have 40 Pottery Club Members — another "most ever" — who pay a nominal fee to use the studio to "throw" on one of our six potter's wheels, hand-build, bisque fire, glaze, and glaze fire their work.

In addition, Recreation Supervisor Sara Caropreso works with various community groups to plan, organize and implement several community events, serving on planning committees for *Cultural Arts Day, PirateFest, Special Olympics Spring Games, Paint in the Park, Youth Arts Festival, National Night Out* and *Greenville Gives*.

In February Arts Staff will partner with the *Support Group for Active Recreation* (STAR) and our Specialized Recreation Staff to host *Cultural Arts Day* from 11 to 3 on Saturday, February 29th. This annual event provides adaptive arts & crafts activities and cultural opportunities for adults with physical disabilities. Event partners include local artist Lisa Jordan, nursing students from Pitt Community College, ECU music education students, and Art Lab artists-in-residence.
