**Anti-Littering Campaign** 

The City's Public Information Office (PIO) has started a campaign to discourage people from littering. This anti-littering initiative stems from a conversation by City Council during its August 18, 2016 meeting.

In this campaign, the PIO is aiming to emphasize the aesthetic appeal of Greenville while encouraging the public to preserve it by putting trash in the appropriate receptacles. EMS Deployment Plan

Beginning September 1, 2016, the Fire/Rescue Department will fully implement a revised EMS Deployment Plan. The plan consists of seven ambulances, staffed with two personnel, strategically stationed throughout the City. Additionally, two quick response vehicles (QRV), staffed with two paramedics, will provide support and oversight at emergency medical incidents. In the event that these resources are committed to an incident, fire apparatuses will remain staffed and equipped to provide timely medical care throughout the city. The district north of the river will continue to be provided care utilizing a fire and EMS combination type response unit staffed by three personnel.

The Fire/Rescue Department implemented a variation of this deployment plan one year ago. Early indications have shown this to be an effective deployment model which allowed the Department to deploy an additional ambulance utilizing existing staff. This model helped to lower the unit hour utilization rate for three of the busiest ambulances, which resulted in a more reliable response to emergencies occurring in the medical and downtown districts. This deployment plan is also in line with recommendations stated from the ICMA Operational Analysis conducted in 2014. The Department will continue to analyze response data and make adjustments as needed to ensure this community is provided a high level of emergency services in a timely manner.










## Figure 1 - Project Vicinity


