







## History & Spacing Requirements



### History

On February 22, 2010, City Council adopted Ord. #10-11 to amend the zoning ordinance to add a 500 foot minimum separation between public or private clubs.

On August 12, 2010, City Council adopted Ord. #10-68 to amend the zoning ordinance to add a 500 foot separation requirement between public or private clubs and residential uses and residential zoning districts. The two 2010 ordinances grandfathered public and private clubs as nonconforming land uses that did not comply with the spacing requirements when the ordinances were adopted.

On September 8, 2016, City Council adopted Ord. #16-054 to amend the zoning ordinance to allow a nonconforming use to expand through construction of a roof deck.



# Public/Private Club Spacing Requirements

No public or private club located in any district shall be located within a 500-foot radius of an existing or approved public or private club.

No public or private club located in any district shall be located within a 500-foot radius of a conforming use single-family dwelling located in any district, or any single-family residential zoning district.





#### Survey of University Towns' Private Club Spacing Requirements

Generally, most university towns do no have spacing requirements for private clubs between one another or from residential uses. Most do have spacing requirements between clubs and places of worship and schools which are typically 100-400 feet. These spacing requirements are required and enforced by the state's ABC Commission.

There is not a spacing requirement between private clubs in university towns:

- University of Arkansas
- University of Virginia
- University of Georgia
- Auburn University
- Penn State
- Texas A&M
- Virginia Tech

University of Florida 100 ft. spacing between residential districts

Notre Dame 1,000 ft. spacing requirement outside downtown

Ole Miss Private Clubs are not allowed in state of MS

Michigan State: Private clubs are not allowed. Only D & E

West Virginia University: Private clubs are not allowed downtown.



## Dining & Entertainment Establishments Spacing Requirements

D & E's with regulated outdoor activities must not be within 300 feet of any residential district, excepting CDF (Downtown Commercial Fringe), which allows single-family dwellings as a permitted use.

To qualify for extended operations of amplified audio entertainment, D & E's shall not be located within a 500-foot radius, including street ROW, of a conforming use single-family dwelling located in any district, or any single-family residential zoning district (RA20; R15S; R9S; R6S; and MRS).





# ORDINANCE NO. 17-023 ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 1 OF TITLE 12 OF THE CITY CODE RELATING TO CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOIC BEVERAGES IN PUBLIC

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Greenville, North Carolina, does hereby ordain:

Section 1. That Section 12-1-2 of the Code of Ordinances, City of Greenville, is hereby amended by rewriting subsection (C)(1) so that said subsection shall read as follows:

(C) Malt beverages and unfortified wine - exemptions.



- (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, upon obtaining the alcoholic beverages permits as required by law, possession and consumption of malt beverages or unfortified wine shall be permitted at:
- (g) The Town Common in accordance with the provisions of the Policy and Procedures for the Conditional Service, Sale and Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages within Greenville Recreation and Parks Facilities . . .



The final section -- 5 -- stipulated that the Town Common Subsection "Sunsets" 12/31/17



Section 5. Subsection (C)(1) (g) of Section 12-1-2 set forth in Section 1 of this ordinance shall expire and shall be null and void after the 31st day of December, 2017.

This provision, commonly known as a sunset provision, is included in this ordinance to ensure that the ordinance, its effectiveness, and its necessity will be reviewed by the City Council within a reasonable time after its adoption.

Recommend extending the Ordinance indefinitely by deleting Section 5.



Some Modifications in the "Policy for the "Conditional Service, Sale & Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages" Will be recommended.



Require a delineated area for sales and consumption but not specifically fencing.

Set an ending time for sales/service at 10 pm, with consumption completed by 10:30 pm, but do not designate a start time.



Rec and Parks is ceding next steps on leveraging this policy at Town Common.



A taskforce will be created from likely users from the public, private, non-profit, and community sectors. The purpose is to discuss how to leverage the adopted policy and comply with existing law.

The City of Greenville Adopt-A-Street Program, began in 1989.

Many types of organizations participate in the Adopt-A City-Street program including school, civic, business, professional, religious and social groups. Some sections of streets are adopted by individuals and families.

#### How to Adopt!

To adopt a City street, your group or business agrees to pick up litter for three years along a mile of roadway within the City of Greenville on a quarterly basis.

The City of Greenville reserves the right to refuse any group adopting a section of street when the adoption may create a safety hazard for City employees or the public, jeopardize the Adopt-A City-Street program or prove counter-productive to its purpose.

#### Safety Precautions

- Before collecting litter for the first time, all
  volunteers must receive adequate safety
  training. The City of Greenville has
  established the following rules to help ensure
  the safety of everyone participating in the
  Adopt-A-City-Street-Program.
- Wear your safety vest.
- Face on coming traffic.
- Maintain a working group of 6 to 10 people
- Avoid work during hours and days that are peak travel times.
- Stop work in inclement weather.
- Avoid overexection
- Be alert for snakes.
- Avoid contact with noxious weeds and areas where herbicides have been applied.
- Do not pick up items on bridges, in tunnels, or on overpasses.
- Stay clear of any construction.
- Use extra caution near edge of curbing and intersections.
- Other safety tips include wearing light-colored clothing, heavy gloves, leather shoes or boots as well as a hat and long sleeves.

Your Organization

#### Your Responsibilities

- Pick up litter along your adopted roadway at least once per calendar quarter. You are encouraged to clean your street more often if needed. We hope two of your cleanups will take place in April and September. Letters will be mailed when special cleanup campaigns are held.
- Make sure everyone in your organizations has a clear understanding of the program and follows the safety procedures.
- Choose an Adopt-A-City-Street coordinator who is at lest 21 years of age.
- Youth groups must have parental permission.
   For safety reasons, no one under the age of 12 is allowed to participate in the program.
   Young children must not accompany you to the street site.
- Whenever possible recycle collected litter.
- You are encouraged to obtain media coverage during your cleanup times.
- Coordinate cleanup dates and times with The City Public Works Department. Your first cleanup should be within 3 months of adoption.
- Clean up areas quarterly (four times per year).
- Maintain a current liability release form for each participant.

#### What the City Provides

The City will maintain/provide a list of potential streets for adoption which can be supplemented by CAC (Community Appearance Commission) and adopting organizations. When your group adopts a street, we will do the following:

- Post a road with your group's name to mark your adopted section of street, if your organization adopts the street for a minimum of 3 years.
- Provide training before litter pickup begins
- Furnish safety vests (which you will be required to wear).
- Provide trash and recycle bags.
- Collect and dispose of filled trash bags when notified by your coordinator of the date and place.
- Present certificates of appreciation to your organization at the end of 3 years.



## **NCDOT Adopt a Highway Program**

- No-Fee;
- 4-year agreement;
- Minimum length of two miles.
- Roadside litter cleanup four times a year or more often if needed.
- Groups can obtain safety vests, gloves, and bags at their NCDOT county maintenance office.
- Signs with a recognition panel installed on adopted roadway.



## **Recommendation:**

- Continue with existing Adopt-a-Street model with an exception on signage. Install signage after two successful clean-ups
- Remove signage where no work has been performed in last year

• Work with PIO and Keep Greenville Beautiful to advertise opportunities
