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

PGV Airport Avigation Easements


- 1) Purchase of an Avigation easement by the PGV Airport Authority on City-owned land located in the approach path to runway 2
- 2) Purchase an avigation easement by the PGV Airport Authority on City-owned land located in the approach path to runway 8



Runway 2 Easement

- Easement is for 5.43 acres, but tree removal is limited to 12 trees on 2 acres, west end
- Tree removal must be done ASAP— runway 2 instrument approaches currently restricted due to tree height
- Airport must apply for federal grant funds by mid-July
- Tentative bid opening July 12th
- Tree removal planned for October/November

Runway 2 approach




Runway 8 tree removal

- Easement is for 36 acres, but tree removal is limited to 12 acres
- Must be done, runway 8 approach currently not available at night due to tree height
- Land is densely wooded, undeveloped wetland with difficult access. Plan is to do selective removal of penetrating trees (and those w/in 10'), remove trees flush to the ground, but leave the roots, and leave the understory
- In discussions with Public Works and Recreation and Parks Dept. about leaving the gravel haul road in place for potential future Tar River kayak/boat access/park
- Plans and Specs being developed, bid date in early August, with tree removal fall/winter

Purpose of Civilian Police Review Boards ("CPRBs") in NC

- ADVISORY BOARD
- Review and Hear Appeals by persons not satisfied with police Internal Affairs ("IA") investigations of complaints and dispositions made by Police Chief.
- Greenville
 NORTH CAROLINA

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 In NC, CPRBs only have authority to <u>review</u> an IA decision and make a recommendation to Police Chief and/or CM.

Purpose of a Civilian Police Review Boards ("CPRBs") in North Carolina

Makeup of CPRB

- City residents appointed by Council, Mayor, or CM.
- Membership:
 - Criminal background check; confidentiality agreement, training.
- CPRB: Hearings/Closed Session & personnel privacy laws.
- CPRB: NO discipline or subpoena power.



Typical North Carolina CPRB Process

- 1. Citizen files Complaint with Police Internal Affairs (IA).
- 2. IA Investigates and issues disposition letter to Complainant.
- 3. Complainant Appeals to CPRB.
- 4. CPRB reviews how the case was investigated and may conduct a hearing (e.g. whether IA abused discretion or "clearly erred" in its disposition).
- 5. CPRB makes recommendation to Police Chief and/or CM.
- 6. Police Chief and/or CM makes the final decision as to the disposition of the IA investigation.



Legislative Authority Needed?

Answer: Yes.

Why? Complaint filed with Internal Affairs (IA) and IA disposition is confidential. See G.S. 160A-168.
