3:00PM -5:00PM Wrap up the day with us at the Gold Post, the MWBE Program's Shared Kitchen Space and



Update on the 2021 Street Resurfacing Project

Construction of the 2021 Street Resurfacing Project began in mid-April 2021. This project includes milling, resurfacing, deep patch repairs, concrete work for ADA improvements, curb and gutter repair, and pavement markings for various streets across the City.

All concrete work has proceeded quickly and is ahead of schedule; however, the milling operations on several streets have revealed significant issues with the existing subsurface base conditions. Efforts such as visual observation of the existing surface cracks, as well as limited asphalt cores taken by the City Asset Management Division to determine existing asphalt depths, were performed in an attempt to determine the condition of the existing subsurface base prior to bid. Even with these efforts, the true subsurface condition cannot be fully known until the milling operation is completed.

The streets of concern have exhibited very soft subsurface base conditions that cannot properly support the construction equipment necessary to repave the surface asphalt. As a result, a significant amount of additional deep patch base repair work is necessary to repair the existing base of these streets and complete the resurfacing work. Providing a strong base is necessary to the longevity of the surface, as the surface is only as strong as the foundation underneath.

The City estimates the additional deep patch base repair will require using approximately \$225,000 of the street resurfacing budget that remained after the lower-than-expected bids received for this year's contract.
