Budget Summary

- FY 15 Budget and FY 16 Plan are balanced (pending resolution of privilege license changes)
- Revenues include a \$.01 property tax rate increase (\$.52 to \$.53 per \$100 valuation)
- Additional revenue from the \$.01 funds newly created Facilities Improvement Fund
- Continue current service levels and programs
- No new employees
- 1.5% Market increase in FY 15; 1.25% in FY 16



Budget Summary

- Sustainable funding level is provided for maintenance of existing facilities and vehicles
- Funding provided at less than sustainable level for transportation (i.e. street resurfacing)
- Budget focuses on City Council's Strategic Goals (see Budget Message for details)
- Staff will focus on completing ambitious capital program:

Two Budget Modifications

- 2. Change in Privilege License Authority For FY 15:
 - Limited to FY 14 rates (i.e. \$2,000 Cap and no additional rate for Internet Sweepstakes)
 - Can only collect from businesses located within City

Impact on proposed FY 15 budget is **(\$592k)**. This must be addressed through additional revenues, expense reductions, or some combination thereof.



Option 1: Revenue Enhancements

- \$.01 on the tax rate yields \$588k after collection costs

Option 2: Expense Reductions

FY 16 Impact of New Legislation

2. Change in Privilege License Authority

For FY 16:

- Complete repeal of authority

Impact on proposed FY 16 financial plan is (\$1.2M).

The Governor and key Legislators have stated their intent to provide some level of replacement funding during 2015 legislative session, but to what extent is unknown.

The impact of a \$1.2M revenue reduction would be substantial and would likely require new revenues and/or service level reductions.

The City is about to begin the second year of the multi-year sanitation plan designed to modernize collection practices and make the fund financially self-sufficient in future years. FY 15 budget decrease of \$32k is because the fund will not yield full budgeted revenues in current year. Actual revenues are expected to increase as a result of a \$1.25 rate increase in FY 15.

FY 14 original budget was unusually large because of anticipated borrowing associated with the Town Creek Culvert project. FY 15 budget includes a \$.50 per ERU per month rate increase to fund new capital and associated debt service as per the approved stormwater utility plan.

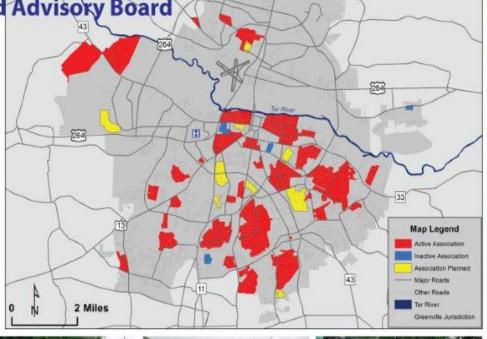

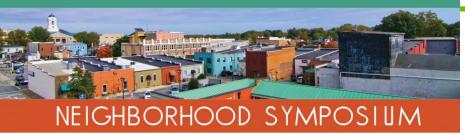

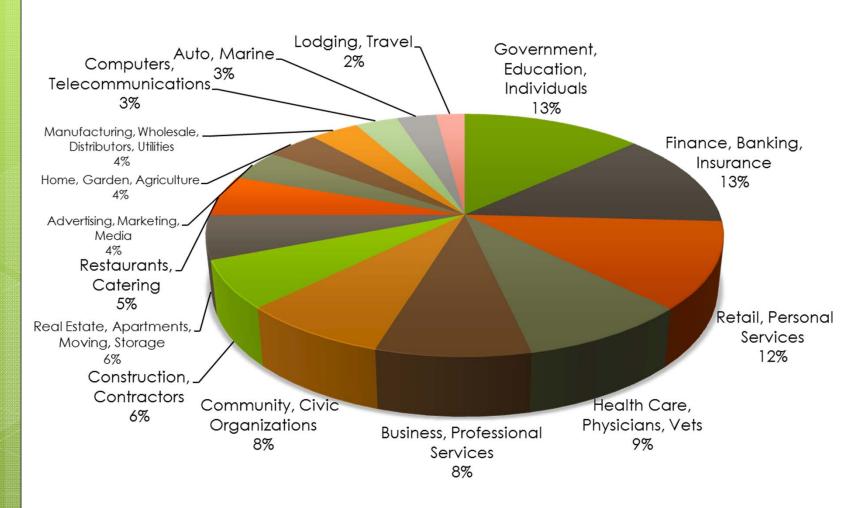

Membership by Category

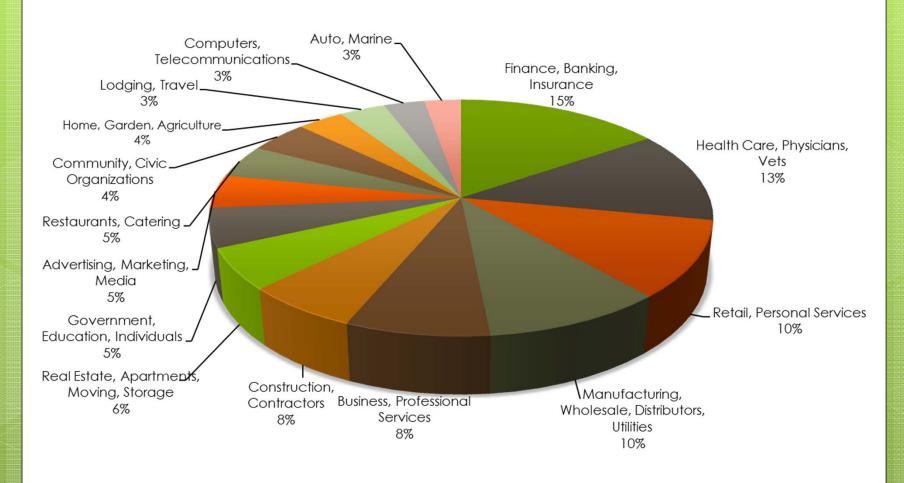
Based on Membership Count

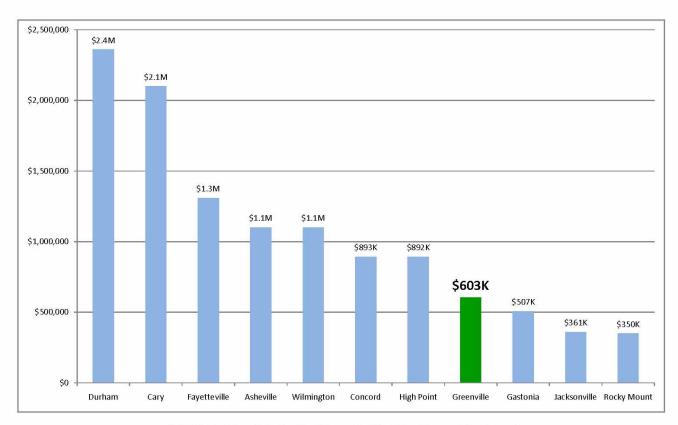

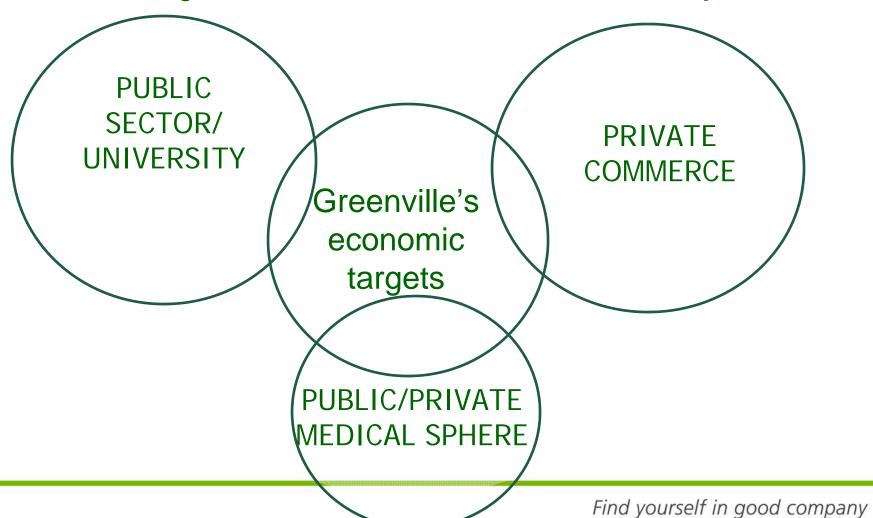
Value of One Cent on the Tax Rate in Annual Revenue

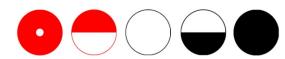

Greenville projects bring diversity

Mike McCarty believes he has kindling that will stoke economic development in downtown Greenville. Taft Family Offices, the Greenville real-estate company he works at as development director, is partnering with local developer Jim Ward to build a \$42 million mixed-use student-housing development next to East Carolina University. The four-story building will have 245 apartments with 550 beds in 300,000 square feet. McCarty envisions 9,000 square feet of retail space on the ground floor filled with pedestrian-friendly businesses such as restaurants, coffee shops or bodegas, serving students living above and those in the dorms across the street. The development will cover a city block and have its own 429-space parking deck, though a car won't be needed to live there. It's close enough to stores and other services that daily errands can be completed

without one. Students will start moving

"We have been trying to get the project off the ground since 2006," McCarty says. The recession zapped the rental market, but it has rebounded recently, reviving the venture, which will bolster the educational and commercial atmosphere around the campus. "We really hope this is a transforming development that gets others going," It's the first project planned near the 10th Street Connector, which will eventually connect ECU and Vidant Medical Center, the largest employer in Pitt County. The connector is expected to open by 2016.

Not far away, at the corner of East Fifth and Cotanche streets, Raleighbased developer CommunitySmith LLC is leading a group of local investors who are spending about \$2.2 million to turn approximately 20,000 square feet into office and retail space. ECU will lease almost half for its registrar office. The balance will be used by a clothing retailer and assorted professional services. CommunitySmith is developing a second project nearby, spending \$900,000 to build about 6,000 square feet of retail space, a restaurant and a nanobrewery. These projects are important to downtown's development, says Holton Wilkerson, CommunitySmith's managing partner. The tenants will attract daytime traffic in a part of the city known for its nightlife, adding diversity and, therefore, stability.

These private developments should get a boost from the public sector. The U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Eastern District of North Carolina moved to a privately owned building in downtown Greenville late last year. An intermodal transit center and parking deck are under development, too.
